President's University Council Report

Key Updates

January Welcome Fair

We successfully delivered the January Welcome Fair 2026 on Tuesday 25th January following the winter exam period, welcoming over 1,500 students to campus and providing a key opportunity for new and returning students to engage with student life at Queen Mary.

The event was our biggest January Welcome Fair to date, featuring over 100 stalls from our societies, sports clubs, student services, and partner organisations. In addition, 15 external organisations attended, including student favourite brands offering access to further opportunities. Library Square hosted a full schedule of performances and demonstrations throughout the day, showcasing a wide range of societies and activities and creating an energetic and welcoming atmosphere on the day for everyone attending.

The Fair was held across multiple campus venues including the Students' Union Hub, The Nest, Drapers and Library Square. Overall, it provided a vibrant introduction to everything we do as a Students' Union and our Clubs and Societies, giving new and returning students a further opportunity to get involved, build community and make the most of their time at Queen Mary.

Student Experience Forum – generative AI usage

The Student Experience Forum is an annual project where the Students' Union collects data from Queen Mary students to help us understand how current trends and developments in the higher education sector are affecting our students. The theme for this year's Student Experience Forum is AI usage among students. The project aims to understand how students use generative AI for academic and non-academic purposes.

We've undertaken an all-student survey, which has received more than 500 responses from students. We've also conducted 15 in-depth interviews. Analysis is now ongoing.

When the analysis has been completed, the findings will be presented at a Student Experience Forum event that brings colleagues from different parts of the university together to discuss the findings and identify actions. If you'd like to join us please contact su-representation@qmul.ac.uk

In addition, we have been working collaborating with colleagues across QMUL to draft a university-wide AI in assessment policy, with a specific focus on ensuring student voice are embedded from the start. Given the growing impact of AI in higher education, it is critical that the policy balances innovation with fairness, academic integrity and clarity for students. Our role has centered on representing student concerns and priorities so that the final framework is practical, transparent and student-informed.

Centre of Volunteering and Outreach

2026 will see the rebrand of volunteering to the Centre of Volunteering and Outreach. For this, the team are preparing to conduct a survey on student knowledge and interest in volunteering, as well as interviewing engaged student volunteers to find out about their experiences. The survey and interview feedback will be used to create a report including recommendations for how to increase engagement. Volunteer Champions have been approached to support the project and gather student insight to ensure that we involve students at all stages.

Further improvements to the website have been completed as well as tidying up our database by removing inactive students to give an accurate picture of engagement. The next stage is to look at the student journey on the website and improve how students can navigate it better.

Societies

Semester two has started with a successful and engaging welcome fair at Mile End which saw 82 groups registered to attend and we held our first Societies Board meeting of 2026, this was also our first board including our new Societies Champions, following last years democracy review. We gave out £13,767.05 in grant funding to 30 societies. The funding went towards a mix of activities and costs such as portering and cleaning for the Debate Society's Debate Comp and materials for the Engineering Society to design FPV drones.

To date, 13,572 memberships have sold across Societies, Volunteering and Student Media and there are currently have over 2,000 committee members across our 293 Societies.

After a small restructure of responsibilities in the Student Engagement team, we have brought back a role that will primarily focus on supporting Academic Societies, as well as facilitate our skills recognition programme (The Skills Award). The intention is to work collaboratively with Faculties to ensure Academic Societies are supported to flourish.

Course Reps

Course Representative Elections took place in January for incoming students and unfilled roles during the first few weeks of term. Typically, these elections focus on a small selection of schools and this academic year 11 positions were available. Going forward, other January intake courses, and those that were not successful in electing representatives are invited to co-opt via our process.

This semester, School Forums and SVCs are taking place, alongside NSS promotion activity to emphasise the impact of Student Voice; both meetings are chaired or co-chaired by appointed 'senior' Course Representatives, all of which were appointed last semester.

Course Representative numbers are excellent, with 574 Course Representatives, and 19 PGR Subject Representatives. Finally, engagement in Course Representative training has risen, through consistent promotion and support from the Student Voice team; engagement has increased by 2.6x since December 2024/25 and has risen from 32% of Course Representative population to 93%.

National Student Survey

We are pro-actively supporting the university's National Student Survey (NSS) campaign, working in partnership to encourage final-year undergraduate students to share their feedback on their academic experience. We are promoting the survey through our student communications, Course Representatives and Executive Officer engagement at events on campus, helping to raise awareness of the importance of the NSS and how student feedback contributes to improving the student experience.

As part of this work, QMSU is collaborating with the university to offer a £5 reward for eligible students who complete the survey. Students can choose to spend the £5 at participating outlets on campus or online or donate the amount to a Club or Society of their choice. QMSU is managing the process for distributing and administering this incentive.

We are also working with Course Representatives to further support the campaign. We have issued regular communications to them and held a lunch and learn event to empower them to encourage participation within their programmes and highlighting through Course Reps how feedback can lead to tangible improvements in teaching, learning resources and student support.

Study Well

Our winter edition of Study Well has completed after a fantastic campaign with events and articles from the university and Students' Union. We recently hosted our petting zoo in the Hub with 140 students attending, a high turnout for an in-person event before term began. We have also hosted other events such as a Hot Chocolate and Wellbeing pack giveaway in the Garrod Building, multiple get active sessions in Library Square, and a drop-in crafting session. Overall, the Winter Study Well campaign was successful, engaging

with a wide variety of students supporting them through different events. We will look to continue this in our summer edition of the campaign.

Spring Elections

The Spring Elections is the main election in the Students' Union, where students elect the 6 full-time Executive Officers, 10 part-time Student Representatives and 4 Student Trustees for the upcoming academic year. All students can put themselves forward for the roles. This year, QMSU completed a full rebrand of the Elections to align with the Democracy Review. This included a full review of all content and messaging, introduction of a new Elections website and the roll-out of an extensive range of new physical, print and digital assets to promote the opportunities available.

Nominations closed on 2nd March. At the close of nominations 189 students had nominated themselves for a role, but following the manifesto and statement deadline 102 students have been approved to continue their participation in the election. Voting will take place from 23rd March until 26th March, and the results will be announced at the Results Party in The Lounge on 26th March.

Student Opportunities

QMSU Volunteering Partnership Award

QMSU Volunteering were recently recognised with the University Partner Award from Solidarity Sports at their Volunteer Appreciation Night. The award recognises the strong and collaborative partnership between the Students' Union and the charity in delivering meaningful volunteering opportunities for Queen Mary students. Over the past year, Queen Mary students contributed more than 250 volunteering hours through the partnerships, supporting programmes designed for children who have experienced complex trauma. Activities delivered include sport, healthy living initiatives, arts activities, educational trips and mentorship programmes aimed at supporting wellbeing and creating positive experiences for young people.

Volunteering:

Our team hosted a Volunteering Fair which over 130 students attended, with stalls from 22 charities and organisations who offer volunteering opportunities to our students. It was a great opportunity for our students and partner organisations to come together, network and find opportunities or volunteers.

In total, Students have logged over 2,000 hours of volunteering through our platform so far, this academic year, and our Volunteer Groups have more than doubled their membership numbers compared to last year, reaching 622 free memberships.

Together with the Volunteer Champions, the team organised five events for Student Volunteering Week, with students decorating plant pots for the garden at St Joseph's Hospice, making cards for a local care home and donating to Bow Foodbank. The team also hosted a well-attended Skills Award session about utilising skills acquired through volunteering, highlighting the employability aspect of volunteering.

Raise and Give (RAG)

We had a hugely successful start of term with students raising over £45,000 for charity so far this academic year! Multiple large RAG events took place in January, raising money for the nominated charities. BL Dance successfully ran their annual Strictly Come Dancing shows across 3 nights, and the RAG Officers organised I'm a BNOC (Big Name on Campus) get me out of here, raising almost £5,000 in total for charity.

Participation Fund

We have re-launched our Participation Fund to support students and enable them to join our student groups and events if they are under financial pressure and might otherwise not be able to participate. Since the re-launch in mid-January, we have exceeded requests compared to the whole of last year and

have allocated over £200 to students already. Requests ranged from covering membership costs, printing for a presentation at society conferences or ticket costs covered for some of our cultural balls.

Individual Society Updates

The Dental Society hosted their trade fair; a busy and exciting event where the society invited representatives from dental companies across the UK to meet with students who could learn more about different career opportunities. Members could discover new materials and gadgets with the chance to win memberships and equipment. The fair was successful, with the society securing sponsorships from 18 different organisations and providing an excellent experience with a busy atmosphere for BL Dental students.

After a challenging first term, the Arab society worked extremely hard to host their annual Arab ball, inviting societies from across London to join them in a decadent and joyous night of celebration. The committee started with some challenges to overcome, including financial constraints, but they overcame this to ensure the Arab Ball could happen. They re-thought the event, found great new deals and worked closely with our team and succeeded in making the event financially possible whilst also managing to give students an even better experience than prior years. The event had excellent attendance with over 300 tickets sold. The group's determination and positive attitude made it possible and resulted in an excellent event!

Student Media

We now have five Student Media Outlets, and we have allocated £3,980.58 grant funding to support them. This is being used for a variety of activities, such as running collaborative events, raise awareness or print publications.

Employability

Our five student-led sessions have now taken place with some great feedback from attending students such as: "Great talk by the speaker, friendly and communicated teachings well" and "Was a great session!"

Generally, across all our session so far, we have received feedback from 144 students and out of these 144, 99% gave it the highest or second highest rating when answering if they felt the session helped develop their skills and 99% gave it the highest or second highest rating when answering if they felt that this session helped them with presenting their skills to an employer.

Try Something New Events

Our events programme has continued into Semester 2 with a broader and more diverse range of activities designed to trial new formats and ensure our offer resonates with the wide variety of students within our community in line with our 2030 Strategy.

Highlights included a live screening and event for the Super Bowl at Drapers, which welcomed over 200 students for the game. Alongside this, several new event formats were introduced, including the Drapers Rodeo, a country-themed line dancing night, and Lunar New Year Paper Fortune Cookie Making. We have also expanded our cultural and social activities with museum trips to the Museum of the Home and the Wellcome Collection, as well as creative and relaxed social events such as Pick Paint Plant, Tabletop Games Nights, Charm Making, and Meet Your Matcha.

In addition, a programme of Welcome Events for January start students was delivered to help new students connect with the community. These included the Associate Students Mixer, Great Scavenger Hunt, and Just Desserts Night, providing opportunities for students to meet others and engage with Students' Union spaces early in the semester.

Graduate Recruiter Collaborations

We have continued to deliver a series of graduate recruitment and careers engagement events on campus in partnership with the Queen Mary Careers Service. These events aim to support students' career development by increasing awareness of graduate opportunities and connecting students directly with leading employers. So far in Semester 2, we have hosted organisations including Teach First, HSF Kramer, and Enterprise Mobility. Teach First delivered a Pizza Pop-Up event, engaging students in informal conversations about careers in teaching and leadership. Queen Mary continues to be one of Teach First's largest sources of graduate recruits.

These events build on a successful programme delivered in Semester 1, which welcomed organisations including Deloitte, PwC, Lloyds Banking Group, EY, A&O Shearman, and Mazars LLP. Through these activations, students have been able to explore career pathways, meet recruiters and gain insights into graduate recruitment processes across a range of sectors.

Queen Mary Football Clubs Charity Match

The Men's and Women's Football Club recently organised a charity football match against Kings College London held at the Olympic Park, raising over £8,700 for UNHCR UK, the UK charity partner of the UN Refugee Agency. The student-led event brought together players and supporters from both universities and attracted over 1,000 spectators, demonstrating strong engagement from our wider student community. The event was part of a broader fundraising effort led by the football clubs, which included initiatives such as ticket sales and additional fundraising activities organised by students. It is also an example of how our student-led sport and society community initiatives can bring students together whilst raising funds for important global causes

Graduate Attributes

Tushar Goyal, Vice President Science & Engineering, has been working with the QM Academy to refine the language used around graduate attributes. The intention is to ensure the framing is clearer, more accessible and reflective of the skills of students. This is also to help with ongoing implementation of the university-wide employability framework. The work will also help to ensure consistency across the university and for helping students better understand, articulate and evidence their development.

Student Voice

LGBTQ+ History Month

February marked LGBTQ+ History Month with a programme of events celebrating LGBTQ+ communities, promoting allyship, and encouraging reflection on the history and contributions of LGBTQ+ people. This year's national theme, "Science and Innovation," highlighted LGBTQ+ trailblazers who have shaped discoveries, technologies and ideas that continue to influence the world today. The theme also created opportunities to open conversations around inclusion, empathy and the importance of representation in academic and professional spaces.

Students' Union representatives, student groups and partners delivered a series of student-led events and activities across the month. These included queer bar nights, craft sessions, talks and the National AIDS Trust Fundraising Gala, providing welcoming spaces for LGBTQ+ students and allies to come together, build community and raise awareness of issues affecting the community. Alongside in-person events, the Students' Union also delivered a digital awareness campaign, sharing "28 Icons in 28 Days" on Instagram, highlighting influential LGBTQ+ figures whose work has shaped science, culture and society. Through this programme of events and campaigns, QMSU aimed to celebrate LGBTQ+ identities, recognise the impact of LGBTQ+ innovators, and continue building an inclusive community at Queen Mary.

Jewish Heritage Fortnight

Nadia Valman, Professor of Urban Literature at Queen Mary, with the London Borough of Tower Hamlets hosted a guided walk as a part of the Holocaust Memorial Day commemorations and we offered a space for those to come and turn on a candle in an act of remembrance and part of the wider Light the Darkness national remembrance organised by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust. We also ran events surrounding Jewish food, which was inspired by a successful event last year, where students came to learn about Jewish snacks. We are also currently researching an article on the Novo Cemetery to also share knowledge of the history of the Jewish Community on campus.

Engagement with Tower Hamlets Women's Commission

We have been actively engaging with the Tower Hamlets Women's Commission to ensure student voices are represented in local discussions on women's safety and equality. In December we attended the Commission's public review on safety in public spaces, representing university students and highlighting the experiences of women navigating campus, accommodation and the wider borough. The discussion brought together local organisations, policymakers and public services to explore ways to improve safety and opportunities for women in Tower Hamlets. Following this, in February the Women's Representatives hosted an online engagement session with the Women's Commission, providing a space for women students to share lived experiences and contribute to discussions around safety, health, employment and community leadership. The session enabled participants to raise issues affecting women and students locally while helping inform the Commission's ongoing work.

This engagement forms part of our wider work to ensure that student perspectives are included in local policy conversations, particularly on issues such as women's safety, gender equality and community wellbeing across Tower Hamlets.

Women's Week and This Girl Can

Women's Week 2026 from late February to early March featured a programme of activities celebrating women's achievements, promoting gender equality and creating opportunities for discussion, empowerment and community building across the student body. The campaign has brought together students, societies, staff and external partners through a diverse schedule of events including career, wellbeing, cultural and educational activities. Highlights included a career and leadership session with Joanne Rose, workshops exploring gender justice and activism, society-led events, film screenings and community activities designed to encourage participation and discussion around women's experiences and achievements.

The programme also incorporated our This Girl Can week sessions, aimed at encouraging women to engage in a variety of physical activity sessions such as climbing, strength training, spin classes and reformer Pilates in supportive and inclusive environments. Overall, the campaign has provided students with opportunities to celebrate women's contributions, connect with peers and engage in meaningful conversations about equality, representation and empowerment within the Queen Mary community.

Alumni Engagement Project

Hassam Naeem, Vice President Liberation, International & Postgraduates, has continued work on the Alumni Engagement Project. A new webpage has been launched, promotional material prepared for graduation in April and Summer and associate memberships have been made more accessible and streamlined for alumni. Alumni can now more easily join societies, volunteer, support fundraising, access selected QMSU events and engage with the Get Active programme. www.qmsu.org/alumni

Goes Continental Campaign & Cultural Unity Week

Hassam and Maria Rubani, Vice President Barts and the London, along with our BLSA BAME Representative have launched this year long initiative celebrating all seven continents across our globally diverse student body of 170+ nationalities.

Each month highlights one continent through educational content on our channels and supported in our outlets through initiatives such as culturally relevant drinks, promoting continental awareness and cultural celebration on campus. The project will culminate in Cultural Unity Week at the end of the academic year, bringing students together in a campus-wide celebration of unity and shared identity.

#WeAreInternational Awards 2025

Queen Mary student, Gowri Promy, has been recognised nationally after winning the Community Impact Award at the #WeAreInternational Awards 2025, organised by the UK Council for International Student Affairs (UKCISA). The awards celebrate outstanding contributions that international students make to their universities and communities across the UK.

Gowri received the award in recognition of her leadership and community engagement through the Lawyers Without Borders society at Queen Mary. As President, she played a key role in expanding the society's activity beyond academic discussion, creating opportunities for students to engage directly with human rights issues and community initiatives. Through events, awareness campaigns and partnerships with external organisations, Gowri helped connect students with opportunities to support human rights advocacy, community engagement and social justice initiatives. Her work also raised awareness of global and local human rights issues while encouraging students to apply their academic interests to real-world challenges.

The #WeAreInternational Awards 2025 received more than 420 nominations from over 120 institutions across the UK, highlighting the scale of competition and significance of this recognition. Interestingly Queen Mary was the most nominated university at the event, reflecting the strong engagement of its international student community.

Barts and The London and Whitechapel

The BLSA Board is a sub-group of the Students' Union made up of students holding a variety of positions across activities, education, liberation and welfare roles. All roles have been filled ensuring comprehensive student representation across the faculty. A focus has continued embedding structured student voice and expanding institutional positioning. Rather than responding to isolated issues, we have worked to formalise representation pathways including embedding academic representatives within research institutes to create consistent, senior-level feedback mechanisms.

Meanwhile, we have progressed with EMSA and IADS membership which will strengthen our international connections and expand professional opportunities for our students. The aim is to position SMD students not only as course participants, but as contributors within wider national and international networks.

In welfare we have recently focussed on practical accessibility and financial equity. This has included supporting essential accessibility improvements, such as lift repairs, alongside continued advocacy regarding estate maintenance. Work is also underway to expand hardship and conference funding streams to ensure financial barriers do not restrict academic or professional progression. A key challenge remains balancing immediate student needs with longer-term funding constraints, and work continues to formalise clearer, more transparent funding pathways.

Community development this term has focused on strengthening belonging whilst improving operational infrastructure. Cultural initiatives, including interfaith and events as part of Goes Continental have aimed to foster cross-community dialogue in a diverse student body. Alongside this, we have also continued to develop our sponsorship and grant funding to reduce reliance on ad-hoc funding and improving long-term planning capacity for student groups and engagement.

Rest of the SU

New Communications Framework

We have developed and implemented a new Communications Framework to guide how the organisation responds to reputational issues, public statements and press enquiries. The framework sets out a clear process for identifying, escalating and managing communications risks while ensuring responses remain student-led, transparent and aligned with the Students' Union's values. In addition, the framework introduces a tiered risk system to ensure communications responses are proportionate to the level of reputational risk. This system clarifies decision-making, escalation routes, Executive Officer involvement and sign-off requirements, enabling the Students' Union to respond quickly, consistently and with appropriate governance

oversight. It also formalises collaboration with the University's Communications Directorate and Press Team when issues overlap with the wider institution, and sets out monitoring, review and learning processes following communications responses. Overall, the framework strengthens the Students' Union's ability to manage reputational risk, coordinate communications during sensitive situations and protect the organisation's credibility with students and stakeholders.

Qmotion

Qmotion and Advice and Counselling have partnered up to support the wellbeing and development of parts of the student community. The Black female therapy group encourages young black women with mental health challenges to improve health and wellbeing through physical exercise and talking therapies. This has been done through the WHEN Group (Women Higher Education Network), through classes and one to one sessions that develop confidence and fitness ability.

Qmotion are also supporting the Phoenix college by placing an intern for work experience during semester 2. The team are about to launch a new service for it's members with the launch of 3 new gym courses aimed at educating and coaching members of all levels. These will be the Gym foundation, learn to lift and group strength.

QMSU Perks App

The QMSU Perks App has launched, a new digital platform designed to enhance the student experience across Students' Union venues and services. The app enables students to access rewards and exclusive offers, earn loyalty stamps and order ahead of time in our venues. The app will also be used to reward student engagement in activities within QMSU. Since its launch in December, over 1,000 users have registered on the app with over 2,700 loyalty transactions processed.

This year, we were proud to be shortlisted for Best Students' Union at the 2025 WhatUni Student Choice Awards, recognition based entirely on student feedback. We also saw progress yet again on our NSS Question 26 score to 79%. This reflects the commitment and energy of our student leaders, staff, volunteers and student groups who make QMSU such a vibrant and supportive community.

As we look ahead, we remain focused on deepening our impact, strengthening our partnerships and responding to the evolving needs of our diverse student community, despite the challenging environment within the sector. We are excited to continue delivering our 2030 Strategy and shaping a Students' Union that truly works for, and belongs to, every student at Queen Mary.

Faith & Contemplation Spaces

This was one of our most significant student engagement projects of the year, generating 1466 responses from a wide range of faiths and backgrounds. The findings provided robust evidence that current provision is not meeting student needs and has directly informed high-level discussions with the University.

The resulting report, drawing on detailed student feedback, sets out clear recommendations to improve inclusivity, accessibility and capacity of faith and contemplation spaces on campus. Early engagement has already strengthened the case for change, helping to place equitable faith provision firmly on the institutional agenda and laying the groundwork for long-term improvements that will benefit current and future students.

Students who work

Recognising that balancing employment alongside study is a reality for many students, we launched a survey engaging **over 500 students** to better understand the pressures faced by those working during their studies. The findings provided clear evidence to inform high-level discussions with the University and strengthened our advocacy for improved institutional support.

Insights from the research have already shaped reports and communications highlighting the experiences of self-funded students and those managing work alongside academic commitments. This work is helping to drive greater recognition of working students' needs and influence more practical, targeted support across the University.

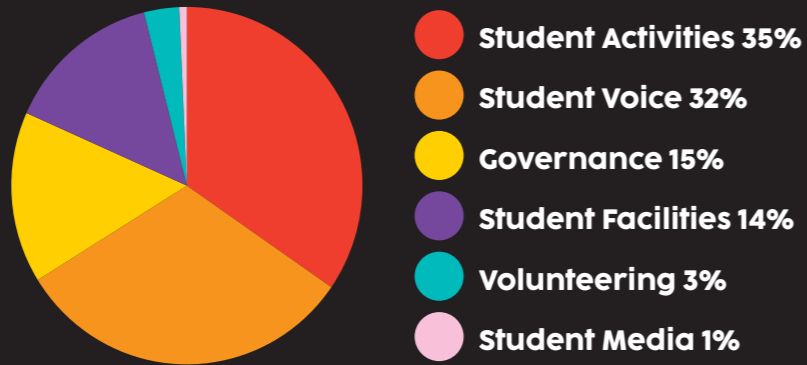

We are grateful for the University's support in providing a block grant of £2,944.075 to QMSU. This funding is focused directly on front-line student benefit.



In addition, through self-generated income from QMSU Services, additional external grant funding and student expenditure we spent a total of £4,542,403 delivering our charitable and student-facing services, significantly increasing the total value delivered to students beyond the block grant alone and recognising the marked amount of self-funded student-led activities taking place within QMSU.

Through careful financial management, strong cost controls and a continued focus on value for money, we delivered a £50,524 year-end surplus, meeting our £50k Reserves Policy target and strengthening our financial resilience during a challenging sector climate.

We also received a clean audit opinion and maintained our 'going concern' status, providing assurance of our sound governance and long-term sustainability.

Our commercial spaces are not just retail, café or gym venues, they are vital community hubs that play an important role in student wellbeing, connection and belonging. From socialising with friends to participating in events or activities, these spaces help students engage fully with university life and strengthen their relationship with the Students' Union, directly supporting the delivery of our strategy.

Beyond their commercial function, our spaces also provide significant in-kind support to our charitable objectives, totalling £215,378 this year. For example, our bars and cafés host hundreds of student group and student-facing events, while Qmotion is used daily for club and recreational sport training, classes and activities, with extensive staff support provided in-kind. Together, these contributions maximise value for money and help deliver more to students without increasing costs.



Our strategic pillars

Our strategic pillars bring the work of the Students' Union together and span across all that we do. They are evidence-based and have been created from the insights we have collected from our students, student representatives and staff. Pillar 1

Building an authentic student voice.

Student voice sits at the heart of everything we do at QMSU. This year, we strengthened the ways students shape decisions, influence change and hold both the Students' Union and the University to account. From everyday feedback to national advocacy, we focused on making it easier, more accessible and more meaningful for every student to be heard. Throughout we have tried to listen widely, act transparently and deliver tangible changes shaped by students, for students.

Student Experience Forum

We held in-depth, one-to-one conversations with students from across faculties and programme types to understand what matters most to them in 2025. Analysis of these discussions revealed cross-cutting themes, from email overload and communication challenges to the ongoing cost-of-living impact, as well as what students value most in their university experience: community and connection.

The findings were presented to staff from the Students' Union and the University, and will help shape future improvements.

Elections Success

We recorded our second-highest voter turnout on record, with 5462 students casting a vote in the Spring Executive Officer Elections – despite the removal of over 70 roles compared to comparator elections following the Democracy Review. Every position was contested, with 58 candidates across six roles. Engagement was boosted through our VoteFest festival event in Library Square and Candidate Question Time events at Mile End and Whitechapel, creating visible, accessible opportunities for students to take part in campus democracy.

Postgraduate Consultation Group Success

The group continued with four meetings this academic year. In these meetings, Postgraduate Research students (PGRs) have a space to share their experiences at Queen Mary and suggest improvements. This year's topics included funding, work-life balance and engagement with the Students' Union. Examples of outcomes from the meeting were new postgraduate events and the new Postgraduate Lounge, a weekly event held in The Lounge to substitute for a postgraduate common room. Here, postgrads can drop-in, meet new people and partake in some low-pressure games and activities during study breaks.



Russell Group Partnership

Working with other Russell Group Students' Union's we co-launched the flagship International Students Report and actively lobbied MPs and Lords through the All-Party Parliamentary Group on International Students, representing the interests of Queen Mary's 10,000+ international students at a national level. Separately, we also worked with other institutions in London to lobby the government for a London weighting on the stipends of PGR students at Queen Mary, supported by insights from our collaborative survey with UCU to better understand the needs of PGR students to inform future lobbying and policy advocacy efforts.

Tell Us Campaign

During our Autumn Tell Us campaign, Executive Officers gathered feedback from more than 2,500 students through surveys, focus groups and drop-ins, directly shaping action on faith spaces, MBBS assessments, academic advising and support for working students. For example, our Faith & Contemplation Spaces survey received 1,466 responses to support our President's manifesto project to improve faith provision and support for faith groups. A report was created and presented to the university, with actions to be implemented in the 2025-26 academic year.

We strengthened student influence across key academic and campus developments through targeted consultation and advocacy. Focus groups across the Faculty of Science & Engineering gathered feedback to improve advisor schemes and shape future academic support, while we secured the continuation of anonymous module evaluations to protect honest student feedback. At Whitechapel, we worked closely with the Library to inform renovations, advocating for more silent and group study space and a new contemplation room to support wellbeing. In response to the HSS faculty merger, we led a dedicated survey and presented our findings at Senate, ensuring student perspectives directly informed decision-making and future communications, alongside releasing a joint online Q&A live video session with faculty leadership.

Ethical and Sustainable Investments Forum

In response to student interest and previous motions from our student meetings, we launched the Ethical and Sustainable Investments Forum in partnership with the university. The forum gives students a direct voice in shaping how Queen Mary's investments and policies can become more ethical, transparent and sustainable, with representatives from the student community, elected representatives and university stakeholders. We have begun facilitating important conversations about the university's ethical investments policy and met with several university investors including Barclays and Cazenove Capital to gather a deeper understanding of investments the university are making, alongside wider work through the newly established Good Campus Relations Steering Group.



Boosting feedback on Sport

Qmotion recorded 128,829 visits this year. Feedback from 545 members informed targeted improvements to facilities and services, contributing to increased usage and a 99% satisfaction score, despite ongoing space pressures. Alongside this, our Sports team's Balancing Life Survey gathered insight from over 1000 students into how they balance study, work and wellbeing, alongside their physical activity and wellness too, enabling us to evolve our sport and physical activity offer to better support student health and lifestyles.

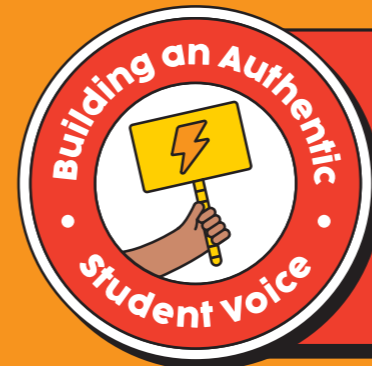
QMSU achieved strong results in the NSS, with our headline score for Question 25 rising from 74% in 2023 and 76% in 2024 to 79% this year. Student Voice was the only section above the Office for Students benchmark, with Question 25 the strongest performer against the benchmark across the University. We also saw notable improvements for scores on student voice and wellbeing questions, both areas where QMSU plays a leading role. We also partnered with the University to deliver a joint communications campaign that increased student response rates.

Spotlight on Democracy

Building a simpler, more accessible Students' Union for every student.

Why we reviewed our democratic structures

Over recent years, engagement with our democratic structures has been inconsistent. While many representatives were highly active, others struggled with workload, meeting attendance and complex processes. Some meetings failed to reach quorum, vacancies remained unfilled and students told us it felt difficult to understand or access how decisions were made.

At the same time, student life has changed. More students study hybrid, work part-time, start courses at different points in the year or are based across multiple campuses. Our structures, last reviewed in 2019, no longer reflected how students engage today.

In response, we commissioned an independent Democracy Review to redesign our system so it is simpler, more flexible and easier for every student to participate in, to deliver an authentic student voice.

Enacting Pillar 1: We will build an authentic student voice.

The Democracy Review is a key way for us to deliver Pillar 1, strengthening how students shape decisions and influence change across QMSU. By simplifying our structures, introducing all-student meetings and creating more flexible ways to participate, we have removed barriers that previously limited engagement to a small group of student volunteers. The new model broadens participation, enhances the legitimacy of student mandates and ensures feedback is acted upon more consistently, creating a system where student voice is more representative, accessible and impactful.

Pillar 2

Supporting meaningful connections.

Meaningful connection and a sense of belonging is central to student success. This year, we focused on creating the spaces, activities and support that help students to meet new people, build lasting friendships and feel part of a welcoming community at Queen Mary – removing the expectation on students to build these networks alone. From investing in welcoming social spaces to delivering a wide-ranging and inclusive programme of events, sport, volunteering and social opportunities, we made it easier for every student to thrive socially as well as academically and find their place.

The Lounge

Working with the University, we secured £150,000 of one-off funding for Phase 1 of The Lounge refurbishment. This transformed an underused, dark and drab nightclub space into a warm and welcoming social space that actively supports student connection and belonging. The space has already become a focal point for community-building, hosting 48 student group bookings and welcoming more than 2,000 attendees in Semester 2 alone, alongside QMSU-led events such as awards ceremonies, Elections Results Nights and Try Something New activities such as Crafternoons. The Lounge represents a key step towards our wider ambition to establish the new Students' Union Quarter at Godward Square, strengthening this area of the Mile End campus into a vibrant student destination.



Women's Fencing Success

Our Women's Fencing team were crowned champions of the 2024-25 BUCS Southern Premier Division – the first Premier League title in the history of QMSU Fencing, achieved in just their second season at this level. The team recorded decisive wins against leading institutions including Oxford, Cambridge, Bath, Kent and UCL, demonstrating the impact of targeted investment through our Performance Sport Programme. As a designated Focus Team, they benefited from enhanced support such as strength and conditioning coaching and sports therapy, highlighting how structured performance investment can deliver improved sporting outcomes.

In response to student feedback calling for more inclusive, alcohol-free ways to socialise, we improved our low and no-alcohol offer to ensure more students can take part in campus life comfortably and safely. We enhanced soft drink and mocktail options at Sports Clubs socials and across our venues, creating accessible spaces that support connection and wellbeing without alcohol as the focus, recognised by our Best Drinks Menu Design Award received from NUS. Matcha drinks have also proved to be very popular with our student community, with 28,750 matcha drinks sold in Ground Café alone this year – that's enough for 373 matcha baths!

Celebrating Student Success

We delivered six awards ceremonies to celebrate student achievements and strengthen the sense of community across our activities, generating more than 900 nominations and bringing together over 500 attendees. By hosting most events in QMSU spaces and keeping them free or low cost, we maximised accessibility and value for money, ensuring more students could take part. Our Education Awards were hosted at Drapers Hall, with the venue provided free of charge by the Drapers' Company.

Success for Women's Football: Community Outreach

The Queen Mary Women's Football Club were nominated for the Community Outreach Project at the 2025 BUCS Football & Futsal Workforce Development Awards in recognition of their eight-week programme delivering free after-school football sessions to girls at Globe Primary School in Tower Hamlets. The initiative boosted community engagement, expanded access to sport for local children and supported professional development for student participants, who received FA-accredited qualifications in coaching or refereeing as a result.



Improving Support for Student Clubs & Societies

To help society committees plan engaging and well-run activities for their members, we improved the support available to them by significantly reducing response times to enquiries and reviewing and enhancing our training programme and committee resources. This has enabled student leaders to organise events more efficiently, improve their offer and deliver a better experience for their communities.

Welcome Fair Events

Our Welcome Fair events are a highlight in the calendar in September and January and saw more than 11,000 students attend our largest community-building moments of the year, creating a vibrant gateway into student life at Queen Mary. With over 200 stalls from Clubs and Societies and 50+ external brands and charitable organisations, students were able to discover opportunities, meet new people and find communities that match their interests from day one. An outdoor performance space featured over 25 live performances that further showcased the breadth of student talent and activities on offer, helping new and returning students feel connected, informed and part of campus life.

Spotlight on Volunteering

Our Volunteering Service is supported by £95,367 of block grant funding from the University. Following a rebrand and website revamp, it continued to deliver meaningful opportunities that connect students with the local community. Students logged over 5,000 hours of volunteering, taking part in a diverse range of one-off and regular opportunities that make a real difference across Tower Hamlets and the wider London community. This included supporting community events, foodbank and environmental projects and mentoring & youth outreach work. Highlights included Student Volunteering Week, where our Volunteering

Champions ran 5 one-off volunteering events and 3 donation drives to support local charities. Teddy Bear Hospital also ran their Safety Day, where volunteers led a day of activities for 60 school children, educating them about healthy eating and hand washing, alongside a visit from St John Ambulance and the local police. Our Volunteering Officer also organised an Eid Smiles Gift Bag donation drive, donating around 20 gift bags for Haven House Children's Hospice.

QMSU Volunteering not only enriches the lives of local residents, but also helped students develop skills, build networks and strengthen their sense of belonging and connection with other students.

Welcome Crew

Our Welcome Crew, made up of 80 trained student volunteers, provided a friendly and visible presence across campus during the September arrivals period, supporting students and helping students connect as they settled into university life. The team offered guidance, signposting and peer support, helping new and returning students navigate campus, access services and connect with activities from day one. By creating early moments of reassurance and connection, the Welcome Crew helped students feel informed, confident and part of the Queen Mary community from the outset.

National Community Impact Award Win

Gowri Promy as named the Community Impact Award Winner at the UK Council for International Student Affairs (UKCISA) #WeareInternational Awards 2025, recognising her contribution to the international student experience and wider community. Gowri's work, including her leadership of Lawyers Without Borders to connect students with local charities, human rights education and advocacy networks, exemplifies the real-world impact our students have beyond campus, and the breadth of student influence, leadership and community engagement supported through QMSU.

WhatUni Awards Success

QMSU was shortlisted for Best Students' Union at the 2025 WhatUni Student Choice Awards, with nominations based entirely on student feedback. This external recognition positions QMSU among the sector's leading Students' Unions and validates the impact of our work to resonate with every student. It reflects the collective efforts of our student leaders, staff, volunteers and student groups in creating a vibrant, supportive and inclusive community. We were delighted to join colleagues from the University to celebrate the achievement at the awards ceremony.

Open Iftar & Ramadan

Two Open Iftar events were held to bring students together in celebration of Ramadan, creating inclusive spaces for connection across our diverse community. Open to all, more than 750 students took part, with feedback showing the events had a strong impact. 87% said the Open Iftars helped them connect with others and 84% reported feeling part of a community supported by QMSU.

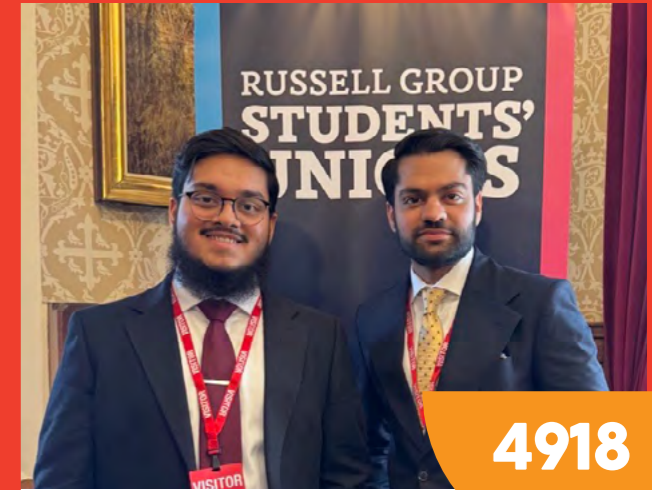


Women's Wellbeing & Safe Spaces

Over 150 students took part in our pilot of women-only spaces. These safe, comfortable environments to eat, socialise, relax and study in improved student wellbeing and built a stronger sense of community. Findings were shared with the University and inspired expansion of our offer through regular Women's Wellbeing Walks, events and study sessions to provide ongoing, dedicated support and opportunities to connect.

Tackling Islamophobia

Following a public attack on our Executive Officers and ongoing feedback from Muslim students, we have prioritised addressing Islamophobia to strengthen safety and inclusion across our community. Collaboratively with the University, we raised awareness of lived experiences, produced a report with recommendations for change and introduced islamophobia training for staff. We also partnered with the University to begin training senior leaders and Council to improve accountability and deliver long-term cultural change.

Russell Group Survey

Working in partnership with other Russell Group Students' Unions, we led a sector-wide survey on the international student experience, capturing 4,918 responses, including 396 from Queen Mary students. The resulting report was launched at the Houses of Parliament, elevating student voices to a national platform and directly informing policy and advocacy on issues affecting international students across the UK.

Postgraduate Communications Project

Funded through the Enhancing Research Innovation Cultures Fund, we delivered a targeted communications and engagement project to better connect with postgraduate students. This included launching a dedicated Postgraduate Hub on our website, developing postgraduate-specific events and programmes, introducing segmented-personalised communications for PGR students and rolling-out a range of new print and digital assets across our campuses. Our communications consistently achieved open rates of over 50%, significantly exceeding sector norms, while new online features and research spotlights increased visibility of postgraduate experiences. Together, these interventions strengthened relevance, engagement and sense of belonging among postgraduate students, ensuring our offer better reflects their needs and priorities.



QMSU Brand Refresh

Following the launch of our 2030 Strategy, we fully refreshed our brand and visual identity to better reflect our diverse community and ensure QMSU resonates with every student. The new brand has improved clarity, consistency and reach across our communications, helping more students to recognise our offer, engage with our services and see the Students' Union is relevant to them. Delivered entirely in-house by our part-time designer, the project has achieved impact efficiently while maximising value for money without external agency costs.



Block grant win

Liberating students together

Supported by £20,000 of restricted funding from the University, our liberation campaigns delivered a wide-ranging programme celebrating identity, heritage and social justice across campus. Working with student groups, we marked key moments including Black History Month, LGBTQ+ History Month, Disability History Month, Asian Heritage Month, Jewish Heritage Fortnight and Anti-Apartheid Week. Highlights included large-scale cultural celebrations such as Diwali with the Hindu Society and initiatives such as blood donation events during Black History Month. Together, these campaigns created visible, meaningful opportunities for students to see their identities recognised, build cross-cultural understanding and feel represented within the Students' Union.



Cultural Unity Week

The first Cultural Unity Week was held to celebrate the diversity of more than 170 nationalities represented at Queen Mary and foster greater understanding and inclusion within our community. The programme aimed to challenge unconscious bias, xenophobia and racism, whilst creating opportunities for students to connect through shared cultural experiences. Through securing university funding and partnering with Residential Life, we delivered a wide-ranging series of community-building activities, culminating in the Cultural Unity Ball.

Drapers tops non-alcoholic charts

Student Beans research identified a lack of engaging alcohol-free options across many Students' Union venues nationally. In contrast, Drapers Bar & Kitchen was recognised as a sector stand-out, with one of the largest alcohol-free menus in the UK.

The recognition highlighted our affordable mocktails and expanded matcha and dessert offer, alongside our wider programme of alcohol-free events, demonstrating how we support sober and sober-curious students and ensure our social spaces remain inclusive and relevant for all.

Spotlight on Employability ✨

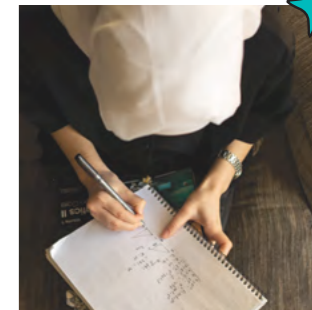
Employability and careers support is a key priority for our students and one we try to focus on throughout our activities. All of our activities and training programmes have an underlying employability focus, with comprehensive training, skills development and induction sessions for student leaders, whilst participants develop a range of skills and competencies by taking part in our range of activities and services. This is complemented by several specific programmes targeted in this area, including some highlighted here.

Upskilling our Students

This year saw 442 attendees at our Skills Award sessions, with 75 completing the Gold Skills Award. The Skills Award is open to all student leaders and student staff at QMSU. Part of the programme saw 67 students completing either mental health or suicide first aid training providing important skills for the students who participated. Students were engaged and thoroughly enjoyed the sessions, actively asking for more and inviting friends to future sessions.



Sports Employability Academy

We launched our new Sports Employability Academy to turn students' passion for sport into meaningful experience, qualifications and paid opportunities. Students accessed coaching, officiating and leadership roles across football, netball, cricket, basketball, fencing and more, alongside non-traditional positions such as events and sponsorship. Participants received free UK Coaching membership and up to £300 funding towards qualifications by completing 10-30 volunteering hours, with clear pathways into paid roles. Backed by targeted funding, including £2,500 for FA-accredited female coaching qualifications, the programme enhances students employability, reduces financial barriers and equips students with practical, career-ready skills while supporting sport on campus and in the local community.

Graduate Recruiter Collaborations

Our programme of Graduate Recruiter collaborations was expanded this year, supporting the work of Careers & Enterprise to help connect students to high-quality post-university opportunities. We hosted a range of leading employers on campus, including PwC, Deloitte, KPMG, Teach First, NatWest, Lloyds Banking Group, the NHS, GradUK, Handshake and Police Now, giving students direct access to recruitment insight, networking and career pathways across multiple sectors.

Pillar 4

Prioritising students' mental health.

Student wellbeing is fundamental to success at university. With 38.2% of students reporting feeling stressed or overwhelmed, we prioritised practical, preventative support that helps students manage pressures and access help when they need it most. From advice and advocacy to cost-of-living support, physical activity, peer connection and safe spaces, we have focused on reducing barriers and building resilience across our community.

Cost of Living Support

To reduce financial pressures and help students focus on their studies, we enhanced our cost-of-living support. This included opening a new food pantry, updating our online cost-of-living hub and partnering with Advice & Counselling to deliver a targeted money advice series. We also championed self-funded students by lobbying for the removal of late fees, conducting research into their experiences and producing a report to inform change, alongside surveys and advocacy on travel costs and targeted work to address gaming and gambling harms.



Food Pantry Expansion

To improve access to essential cost-of-living support, we expanded our QMSU Food Pantry service to the Whitechapel campus, ensuring more students can access free food and household staples closer to where they study. The expansion further helps to reduce financial pressures, helping students to manage rising costs while supporting their wellbeing and ability to focus on their studies.

Talk Club x QMSU

In partnership with Talk Club, a UK men's mental health charity, QMSU delivered a series of peer-led wellbeing sessions combining physical activity with open conversations about mental fitness. Led by trained volunteer "captains", each session followed a simple check-in, activity and check-out format, creating a safe and supportive space for men to connect, stay active and talk openly about their wellbeing. Following positive feedback, the programme will be expanded alongside further initiatives such as our Men's Walk & Talk Club.



Get Active

We expanded our Get Active programme by partnering with Sports Clubs to deliver more accessible, low-cost sessions while providing clubs with additional funding and leadership development opportunities. The programme engaged 1,539 individual participants across a wide range of activities, including cheerleading, volleyball, table tennis and badminton, helping more students stay active, connected and maintain positive wellbeing. This collaborative model strengthened links between clubs, staff and students, delivered strong value for money and received consistently positive feedback.



SpringFest 2025

SpringFest engaged more than 700 students through a week of free, inclusive events designed to reduce stress, support wellbeing and improve connection during a busy point in the academic year. From relaxed social activities to opportunities to try something new, the programme provided accessible ways for students to take a break, meet others and build community on campus. By removing cost barriers and creating low-pressure spaces to interact, SpringFest played an important role in supporting students' mental health and sense of belonging.

Academic Advice Service

Following a successful block grant bid, we expanded our Academic Advice Service by recruiting an additional staff member, significantly improving student access to independent academic support. We formally supported more than 250 new academic cases, alongside numerous informal enquiries, helping students navigate issues including academic misconduct allegations, appeals and complaints. We also began implementing a new case management system to strengthen tracking, data and insight, improving how we evidence impact and value. The service is supported by £32,502 of University funding.



Inclusive PPE for medical placements

In line with policy set by the Annual Student Meeting and BMA, the Vice President Barts and The London secured hundreds of inclusive PPE samples for students to access free of charge ahead of clinical placements. Designed to meet NHS England guidelines and accommodate cultural and religious needs, the provision removed barriers and reduced stress, supporting a more equitable learning experience. We have since submitted a proposal to embed this offer permanently at the University.

Reuse Fairs

More than 700 students accessed free essential items through our Re-Use Fairs in September and January, helping to ease financial pressures and reduce the cost of day-to-day living. Delivered in partnership with Queen Mary Estates & Facilities, the fairs also supported our sustainability goals by reducing waste and promoting reuse, creating both environmental and financial benefits for students and the wider community.

Supporting students who work

Recognising that balancing employment alongside study is a reality for many students, we launched a survey that reached over 500 respondents, capturing detailed insight into students' working lives and pressures. The findings informed high-level discussions with the University and led to the development of written outputs, including a focused piece on the experiences of self-funded students. This work is helping to drive greater recognition and more meaningful support for students managing work alongside their studies.

Sports Therapy Partnership

Our Performance Sport team secured a new partnership with the University of East London, giving our Talented Athletes and Focus Teams access to heavily discounted specialist sports therapy at the SportsDock facility. The partnership improves access to professional injury assessment, rehabilitation and recovery services, including sports massage and cryotherapy, helping student athletes stay healthy, return to play faster and perform at their best, while delivering high-quality support at reduced cost.



Study Well and Self Care & Wellbeing Fair

The QMSU Study Well campaign provided practical, visible support during assessment periods, helping students manage stress and protect their mental health. Through a programme of free activities, study spaces and wellbeing events, including Pomodoro Study Sessions, Yoga, Creative Breaks and our brand-new Self-Care & Wellbeing Fair featuring free food from Deliveroo, outdoor yoga and brand partner-led experiences, we created a programme of low-pressure opportunities for students to rest, recharge and connect. Alongside online resources and guidance available via the Study Well Hub, the campaign promoted healthy study habits and ensured students could access support when they needed it most.

Partnership Agreements

Over the past year, we have worked to improve our collaborative approach by developing and formalising a series of Partnership Agreements covering key areas including the Garrod Building, Human Resources, IT and Estates & Facilities, with further agreements in development for Charterhouse Square and Malta. These agreements aim to provide greater clarity and accountability around service delivery, strengthening joint working and ensuring more consistent, student-focused outcomes across the university.



Sustainability

Sustainability remains at the heart of our operations, and we continue to reflect on how we can reduce our climate impact as an organisation. A highlight of this year was Climate Action Week. Over 250 students and staff attended across 15 individual events, including 51 volunteers participating in a big clean-up of the Regent's Canal alongside campus.

Student Experience Strategy

Working together with the University we have created a set of Student Experience Strategic Clusters, jointly shared with Estates and Facilities. They focus on themes including Physical & Mental Health, Global & Inclusive, Flexible & Accessible and Living & Learning to ensure we work pro-actively together to make progress on improving the student experience. Setting up this framework of initial clusters will allow us to deliver the aims set out in our 2030 Strategy and enhance the student experience for all Queen Mary students.
